Chair's Report

The Group has again been busy this year, with contingents being sent to America for the World Scout Jamboree and also to Haarlem Scout Jamboree in Holland along with numerous, section, group and district level camps and events.

The lodge has seen some more work undertaken, the entrance to the grounds has been completely redone with a reinforced concrete driveway in and the gateway moved slightly to widen the arc in and out. Hopefully this will remove the issues previously where you needed bridging kit to get you vehicle across the potholes that always formed at the gate.

More fencing has been completed, we'll need to look at the external fencing around the woodland area in the coming year to strengthen or replace it to stop the boar and sheep gaining access.

The porch will hopefully be underway by the time you read this, various things have delayed starting it, mainly availability to do the work. The old container alongside the kitchen has now been moved alongside the other one at the front of the lodge. This enabled us to fit it out for stores and also to properly access the garage to start work there.

The archery range we were putting in alongside the road we have now decided will not go there, the cost of the infrastructure for a permanent range ensuring all round safety with the footpath alongside was mounting. We can better use that money elsewhere, so the range will be more flexible so we can put it up for the duration of the activity rather than permanent.

We have had a volunteers' day on the 26th October, many thanks to the two that joined us in appalling weather cleaning, decorating and working on the installation of the structure for a climbing/bouldering wall. A special thankyou to Cath who spent a volunteer day from work at the lodge on her own the Thursday before prepping the entrance hall for painting and deep cleaning the kitchen.... I never realized the glass door on the oven was see through!

We are looking at replacing the flooring in the entrance hall with something much easier to maintain again improving the look and appeal of the lodge which is important when looking to raise funds from hiring it out.

Obviously, all of this requires voluntary help and above all money. Please do look out for requests for help, even if you can only manage an hour or two during a day where we need assistance, it is an hour or two that someone else doesn't have to do or that we don't have to pay someone for.

If you think you could help specifically with any of these please let me know:

- Stores person manage the groups equipment
- Cleaning are you able to pop into the lodge weekly/monthly and spend a couple of hours in the day to try and keep the lodge clean?
- Recycling if we introduced recycling bins for paper/card, plastic, tins and glass would you be willing to do a recycling run on a regular basis? This would reduce what we put in the main bin reducing waste costs.

Finally, I'd like to express my thanks to all the leaders and volunteers that help make the group function, without them there would be no group. If you feel you have something to offer either as a leader, volunteer or on the executive, please speak to myself or any other member of the executive or leadership.

Over the past 12 months I feel I have settled into the Group well and would like to thank everyone for being so friendly and helpful.

During the year one Cub was presented with their Chief Scout Silver Award.

The year has been busy taking part in lots of District events as well as having some interesting and exciting activities/visits as part of the weekly programme.

In November we joined many others in a Remembrance parade.

Wednesday Beavers

Wednesday beavers said they had a lot of highlights. Some were meeting the trash converters van and learning about recycling.

We walked around Parkend and picked up litter using litter pickers. One resident said they were doing a great job of keeping Parkend tidy!

Another highlight was going to Skillzone in Gloucester. We learnt about fire, water and road safety. Also how to keep safe by train tracks and stations. The different interactive activities were really informative. Being locked in a cell in the police station was something most of them didn't like!

Pond dipping at Nagshead nature reserve was also great fun. We found lots of newts, water boatmen, water spiders and many more.

The Wednesday Beavers have completed the Beaver Lodge fire evacuation drills which are held twice a year which is an important part of training.

Treasurer's Report - 1st September 2018 to 31st August 2019

The Accounts included in this report have been prepared by Diane Ruck, Group Treasurer. The Group operates 3 bank accounts:

- HSBC Current account all standing orders are paid into this account. This is the Group's main account for the payment of all running costs; Lodge hires fees and membership subscriptions.
- HSBC Deposit account a contingency account that does earn a very small amount of interest.
- Lloyds Bank Plc this account, opened in May 2019, gives the Group the ability to manage online payments

Direct debit payments

The majority of parents are now paying by Direct Debit – thank you – this is very much appreciated... There is a small saving by paying by direct debit – if you would like to start paying in this way please ask your Leader for the necessary form.

Gift Aid – following a concerted effort of leaders to get parents to sign up for the Gift Aid Scheme, we have for the first time received a payment from the HMRC in respect of Gift Aid on the subscriptions that you all pay for your children. £3,260.08 has been reclaimed this year and further claims will be made on a 3 monthly basis. Annually we receive £15,000 in subscriptions so in theory if everyone signs up for the Gift Aid Scheme we could receive an annual income of £3,750 through the Gift Aid Scheme! If you haven't signed up already, get a form from your Leader.

To utilise this income, the Executive Committee have set up an International/ Activities/Camps fund for young people to apply for funding to subsidise the cost of taking place in such events. For example, attendance at the World Jamboree costs each participant about £4,000. This year a total of £1,700.00 was awarded to 8 of your young people to support their attendance at the World Jamboree in the USA and the Haarlem Jamboree in Holland. This fund is also available to fund Camps in the UK so if you think you may be eligible or would like to apply please speak to your Leader.

In summary, the Group's finances are in a strong position. In view of this, subscriptions fees which were reviewed in 2016, will remain at their current level but will be reviewed again by the Executive in September 2020.


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Monday Scouts

During the spring we focussed on Fire Safety and First Aid and included a great trip to Skill Zone in Gloucester.

The summer term is always really busy and this year was no exception. We packed in Kayaking, Sailing and Windsurfing, Rafting (water pistol warfare). One evening was spent at Wenchford making shelters and pioneering mini-rafts to sail down the stream.



Tuesday Scouts

It's been a good year for Tuesday Scouts, with a great bunch of scouts, a much valued leadership team and a varied and fun programme of activities.

Our leadership team is slightly smaller but is immensely grateful to Lloyd and Bernie who have stepped up increasingly to take on some of the organising and delivery of activities.

It's been a period of change: with many of our older scouts moving on in the Autumn of 2018, the group now has a much younger profile. Some of our older scouts have stepped up into new leadership roles and are on target to complete their Chief Scouts Gold Award by the time they move on to Explorers. We currently have 17 scouts on the books.

We've try to ensure that all our scouts have an opportunity to complete their Chief Scouts Gold Award during their time with us though a wide ranging and varied programme of activities.

Our scouts have participated in various County events, such as Strategy, Canal Boating and Scuba Diving. They have also enjoyed engaging with scouts from other groups through District events including Haarlem, JOTA/JOTI, Water Day, Cooking Competition, Incident Hike and Rifle Shooting as well as partnering with Monday Scouts for various events. These shared experiences and activities are very valuable to scouts and leaders alike.

Some of the highlights of the year have been learning to sail at Llandegfedd Reservoir with the Newport SWAT; picking up some amazing bush craft skills with the ReWild Project at our May Camp; cooking up a Mother's Day Lunch for our scout mums and families; caving with the team from Viney Hill, going to the Pantomime at the Everyman Theatre in Cheltenham, raising funds for the Forest Lions, learning about bee keeping from the Dean Forest Bee Keepers and how to perform some circus tricks with Shooting Stars Circus.

We're proud of each and every one of our scouts. It's great to see them making the most of the opportunities and growing in confidence as they learn to handle life challenges with a little bit more resilience as a result of their time in scouting.

Wednesday Scouts

Last October saw a big change in the group with 8 young people moving up to Explorers and lots of new young people joining. We finished the October half term with a very successful Crazy Golf evening followed by a Climbing and caving camp at Gloucester Warehouse on the weekend which was enjoyed by all those that attended, playing on the digiwall until bed time.

Throughout the year we have completed a Christmas camp with an International theme, thanks to my young leaders and younger leaders, an expedition challenge hike and camp in the Wye Valley in February, with all participants carrying their kit. Some found the rain in the evening hard to cope with but all survived to complete the weekend.

After Easter I found the age of my scouts as suddenly changed now we have lots of year 10-12 year olds and very few older ones, the most dramatic change is the number of girls, for many years there was a maximum of 4, we are nearly at half and half which is great.

In the summer term we had lots of nights out and about including Stand up Paddle boarding and raft building. We have also worked with Rosemary and Sarah at Buchanon Park where in July scouts enjoyed an evening of woodland activities and in September we spent a day with Sarah, Rosemary and their Country side ranger, learning about Forestry work, the equipment they use, having a go at felling trees, planting trees and tree recognition.

September saw another now annual sailing camp, at Avon Sailing Club near Tewkesbury where scouts earned their sailing and nautical badges. Another annual event to our calendar due to popular demand and very good attendance are environment days and backwoods camp weekends in local private woodland, where even the younger scouts, experienced building shelters and sleeping under tarps or in hammocks, making fires and cooking their own food on them and making camp gadgets.

At the beginning of October we visited Gloucester Dry Slope Ski Centre where all scouts managed to use the 'snow plough' to control their speed coming down the slope. This evening was enjoyed by all, with the general comments at the end being when can we come again! Thank you to my Leaders and Young Leader for supporting and assisting with planning events and on the evenings and to all parents for their continued support.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - 2017/2018

Held at Beaver Lodge, Friday 9th November 2018 at 7.30

1. Present:

Steve McAuliffe (Chair), Gareth Ovens Group Scout Leader), Brian Wingfield (Group Secretary), Leaders and Parents.

2. Welcome

The Chair welcomed everybody to the 1st Royal Forest Scout Group AGM on what was a very wet and windy evening, he pointed out the fire exits and procedure. A copy of the reports together with a copy of the accounts was available.

3. Apologies:

These had been received from: Fiona Price, Charlotte Bishop, Diane Ruck (Treasurer), Ang. Healey, Kevin Payne and the DC Gary Law.

4. Minutes of the last AGM

The minutes of the AGM held on 21st September 2017 were distributed to the meeting and the Chair asked for the meetings approval that they be accepted as a true record and the Chair signed them as a true record.

5. Treasurer's Report

The Chair presented the accounts due to the illness of the treasurer, a copy of which was included in the annual report. The Group has two accounts one for all the general finances and the other is held in reserve. Gift Aid is important as this year we have received over £1000 pounds and if everybody completed the forms we could benefit by over £4000 pounds per year and every encouragement is given to parents to pay subscriptions by direct debit and signed up for Gift

Aid. The Group has received a grant from the West Dean Parish Council of £1700 towards the archery range and equipment. We have applied for a grant to enable us to update some of the kitchen equipment.

The Group has a healthy balance and at the last Executive meeting it was agreed that the subscriptions would remain at their present level.

The Executive at their meeting in October agreed that the Gift Aid funding we received would be used to help young people attending International Events. This would be either as a grant or a loan which could be used to organise a fundraising event. All leaders have been given details of this together with the application procedure.

Acceptance of the accounts was proposed by Phil Morton and seconded by Kerry Powell and accepted by the meeting

6. Annual Report and Chair's remarks

The Chair thanked everybody in the Group for their hard work and support throughout the year. During the next few months a start will be made to construct the porch on the front of the Lodge, this will be done in two stages as it will be necessary to leave the garage end clear so that when the container is moved and the garage is removed we will have sufficient room. The fencing along the road is almost complete and the materials have been purchased to erect a fence along the top of the bank by the stream. Leaders, Managers and parents have all worked to contribute to a brighter future for Scouting and said that it takes a special type of person to volunteer.

A plea for help to give a hand for the jobs around the Lodge was made.

The Chair asked the members present to accept the report.

Acceptance of the report was proposed by Claire Chapman and seconded by Alison Buttery and accepted by the meeting

7. Election of Group Treasurer and Group Secretary
